Expressive Animals:

If the music were a line or a shape, what might it be? Express what you hear in the music, in an abstract or representational way. Draw how the music sounds. Using simple sketches, draw part of an animal, and let the music inspire you to express yourself as you fill in the rest. Camille Saint-Saëns, the composer, had a lot of fun writing this piece. I hope you have fun listening and sketching along with the music!

Materials Needed:

Some paper and something you can use to draw. I used pens and crayons because that's what I had, but you can use pencils, pens, markers, crayons, paint, collage materials, anything you might have.



Directions:

Step 1: Draw the Music You Hear Warm-up

- Maybe you're listening to KING FM play Carnival of the Animals right now, or maybe you are listening to a
 recording like this one on YouTube. This one has a list of the names of the sections and the time when they
 start.
- Listen to the music, and think about what it would be if you could see the music. What color would it be? What shape? If it were a line, would it be a long line or a short line? Would the shapes and/or lines be close together or far apart?
- Pretend that you are holding a paintbrush and paint the music. Now try with an imaginary pencil. What would it be like to color this music with a cravon?
- Example: I listened to the first 42 seconds of *Carnival of the Animals*, and sketched this with my pen. Now, you try. What does the Introduction look like to you?




Step 2: Draw Part of a Lion

• The composer Camille Saint-Saëns was inspired by different animals in the different movements. The first movement is the Introduction and the Royal March of the Lion. Here is one way you can draw the parts of a lion's face. You can try to copy these lines, or use your own.


Step 4: Repeat Steps 2 and 3 for Other Animals






