## SYNOPSIS

Be warned: this synopsis has spoilers.

The Very Hungry Caterpillar Show begins with the first story Eric Carle illustrated, *Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See*? The bear sees a red bird. The red bird sees a yellow duck. The yellow duck sees a blue horse. The chain continues with a green frog, a purple cat, a white dog, a black sheep and a goldfish. The goldfish sees a teacher looking at it. The teacher sees children looking at her and asks them what they see. The children see all the animals and say their names.

The next story is *10 Little Rubber Ducks*. A rubber duck machine produces little yellow ducks. Each rubber duck is then painted. Their bills are red, and their eyes are blue. The ducks are packed ten to a box and loaded onto a cargo ship. The captain of the ship calls, "Hello!" The ship is taking the little ducks out across the wide sea to faraway countries. They run into a storm. A wave lifts one of the boxes of rubber ducks up and tosses them into the sea. Ten little rubber ducks fall out. After the storm calms down, the rubber ducks bob up and down on the ocean. The ducks begin to drift apart. They scatter in all directions and encounter different marine life. The 10th duck floats on as night falls. The next morning the 10th duck meets a real mother duck and her ducklings. The ducks greet the rubber duck with a "Quack!" The 10th duck floats along with them as they swim back to their home at the end of the day.

The third story, *The Very Lonely Firefly*, really tells two overlapping stories. A little firefly is born with its wings outstretched in the night sky. The firefly, lonely, searches for other fireflies. The firefly sees a light and flies toward it. The firefly sees the light is a lightbulb. It's in the home of a family searching for the cause of a noisy disturbance. The firefly sees another light and discovers it is the family's candle flickering in the night. Again, the firefly follows a light in the dark only to learn it is their flashlight. In the distance, the family's dog and cat fight. The firefly sees their eyes reflecting light in the night. It sees an owl's reflective eyes, too. With the mystery of the disturbance solved, the family heads to a fireworks show. The firefly follows, mistaking their car's headlights for fireflies. It sees the beautiful fireworks and

when the night grows quiet it continues its search. Finally, it finds a group of fireflies flashing their lights. The firefly is no longer lonely.

The last story of the production is *The Very Hungry Caterpillar*. Under the moon's light, an egg sits on a leaf. The warm sun comes up and out of the egg emerges a tiny, very hungry caterpillar. On Monday, he eats through one apple. On Tuesday, he eats through two pears. On Wednesday, he eats through three plums. On Thursday, he eats through four strawberries. On Friday, he eats through five oranges. On Saturday, he eats through one piece of delicious chocolate cake, one ice-cream cone, one pickle, one slice of Swiss cheese, one slice of salami, one lollipop, one piece of cherry pie, one sausage, one cupcake and one slice of watermelon. After eating all those different foods, the caterpillar has a stomachache. The next day is Sunday and the caterpillar eats through one green leaf. He feels much better. He discovers he is not little anymore. He builds a cocoon and stays inside. More than two weeks later he nibbles a hole through the cocoon and emerges transformed into a beautiful butterfly.

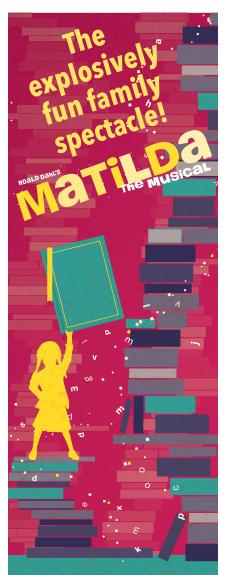
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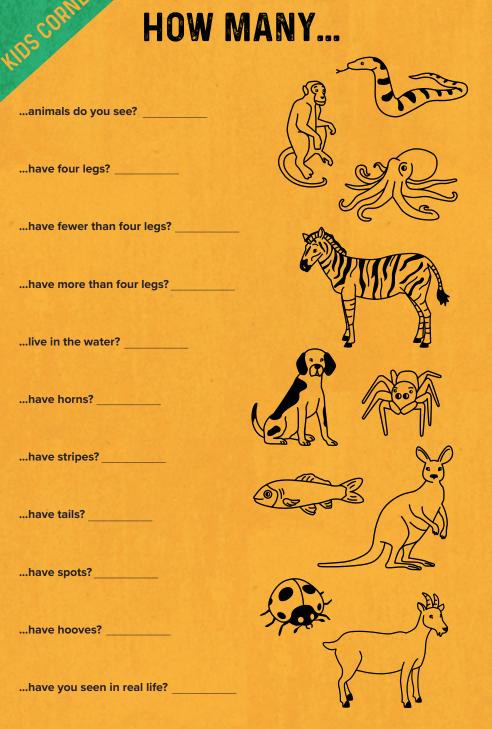
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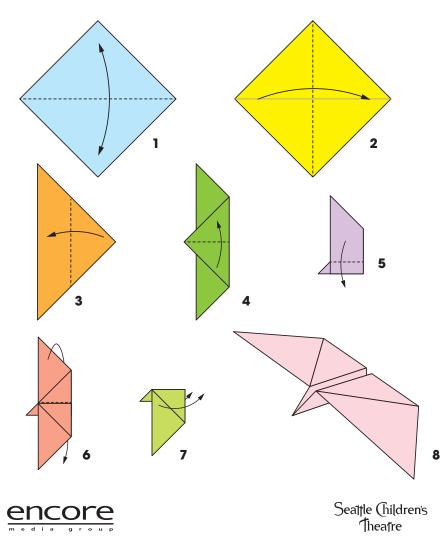




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## A CHAT WITH PUPPET MASTER EXTRAORDINAIRE, ANNETT MATEO

#### Did you dream of being a puppeteer as a kid?

I didn't – I never thought I could be an artist for a living! And if I had, I most certainly wouldn't have thought of being a puppeteer! Growing up, we weren't raised with TV as a regular thing in our lives; we didn't have a TV in the house until I was in grade school. I didn't discover Sesame Street until I started babysitting. I was hooked, but I never thought I could actually go work for them! I wish I had been a bit more adventurous.

## What is your working process like as a puppet designer and puppeteer?

I say that my puppet building is a series of failed brilliant ideas! Usually people approach me with a concept and I will work with them to refine that into something that will work for them. This might involve discussing size, or what puppets can and can't do practically, or the number of puppets they have in mind for a production. Usually, what a puppet can't do is limited by budget. One of the great things about puppets is that they can do just about anything, especially with enough time and money! Once we get settled on what the puppets will be, I sketch them out and try to get an idea of how I want to go about building it: what kind of materials, where movement will happen, and how I will get those parts to move. I don't

get too detailed in this step as I have found over the years that there is much discovery that happens in the building phase. This or that seems like such a great idea until I try and it and realize that it doesn't work with some other step/piece further down the process. Once I have a general idea of how I am going to go about it, I draw it out full-size from different views and start patterning off of that. This gives me an idea of just how long that thing is or where that string needs to go, etc. Then I will start on the mechanical structure: the part that controls the head, mouth, the wings, or whatever. Once I get that part functioning properly (which mostly consists of being easy to move with so there is little wear on both the structure and the puppeteer), I start working on the structure of the body, usually out of some kind of foam depending on what the puppet has to do or whatever other stresses it might be subject to. Then I work on the decorative covering, which might be fabric or paint. The trick and challenge at this point is to make sure that everything that is supposed to move still moves well! This is often a step full of 'brilliant ideas'! The last bit it to put all the small details and finishing touches on in such a way that they will withstand the use of the puppet. The best part is when I get to hand it over to the client and see the smile

on their face and the joy that puppets create – everyone has fun with puppets!

## What has surprised you the most about your work in puppetry?

This is a great question. A couple of things – people have little idea where puppets come from! They are often surprised to learn that puppets are an entirely handmade thing – not from the "puppet store." We don't really have much of a craftsman/trade type society anymore. There are pockets of artisans, of course, but it has become so expensive to hand-make anything that either artisans can't afford to do it, or patrons can't afford the work. So a common question I get is if I get to keep the puppets I make. I understand where the question comes from: how could I give away something so fun? But it's like any other custom commission: they keep the puppets, I keep the money.

I've also been surprised by the constant challenge; it's the thing that keeps me excited every day! When people involve puppetry in their project, they are often very creative people and provide very creative challenges for me. Each puppet is unique; even if I am making the same puppet twice they aren't the same. I have also been surprised that I make so many puppets of the same thing! Like cats for instance – I have made so many cats that friends call me the crazy cat lady! But they are such a common fixture in our lives and live animals on the stage are just not a good idea. It's funny though, I have not made many dogs, other than Toto of course. I have also made a number of horses, many of them full size, and around here salmon of course. Robins, I think for the same reason as the cats. And because they are so popular I have made many, many Muppet-style puppets!

Annett Mateo has been on staff at SCT since 2002. Her work designing, building and performing small theatre puppets to giant-sized festival puppets can be seen in numerous theatres, festivals, libraries and the occasional puppet slam throughout the country.

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
