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Seattle Children's Theatre launches new mental health curriculum following longtime partnership with Kaiser Permanente

Seattle, Wash.— Following a four-year partnership, Seattle Children's Theatre (SCT) and Kaiser Permanente of Washington have decided to conclude its Arts-Based Learning (ABL) program as Kaiser Permanente moves toward a shared national theatre education service model. The partnership successfully developed and implemented the ABL program which reached more than 22,000 students and 2,100 teachers by using drama-based initiatives to support the health and wellness in classrooms across Washington State.

"SCT has been a critical partner in the creation, delivery and success of ABL since its launch in 2017. As Kaiser Permanente makes this transition, we thank SCT for its years of deep partnership," said Jill Patnode Thriving Schools Manager for Kaiser Permanente. During this transition, both organizations are committed to exploring ways to leverage expertise and develop programming in support of students in the community, which includes SCT's launch of Creative Drama for Mental Wellness – a workshop series designed specifically for high school students.

"The pandemic has significantly impacted the mental health of young people in our region, so theatre education that gives students tools to recognize their emotions and practice self-care is especially important," said Elizabeth Coen, SCT's School Programs & Partnerships Manager. "Although we are sad that this terrific partnership is coming to a close, we remain committed to offering high quality school programming that supports students' social and emotional development.

Creative Drama for Mental Wellness is a 60-minute program designed to bring students and their teachers together in an immersive learning environment that is safe, active, and community focused. Guided by SCT Teaching Artists, participants engage in creative play to strengthen trust and collaboration, and then focus their energies inward using structured activities that encourage self-reflection.

"This new program bridges theatre education with evidence-based strategies in Social-Emotional Learning to help students develop self-awareness and make positive choices in addressing their mental health needs, even in situations that are unjust or outside of their control," said Johamy Morales, SCT's Director of Education and Engagement. "These concepts are rehearsed using role-play exercises within the safety of the classroom so that they develop confidence to advocate for themselves when faced with challenges in the real world."

Previously offered through ABL, *Ghosted*, a touring production for students in 9-12 grade and RISE-Up, a professional development workshop for teachers, administrators, and school staff, will transition to Kaiser Permanente's Educational Theatre Education Program. As Kaiser Permanente transitions to this new model, delivery of Ghosted and RISE UP workshops in Washington will be paused until the 2022-23 school year.
